Clarence Darrow said recently at a mass meeting held in Detroit: "I know very little about it (evolution). Speaking in opposition to compulsory Bible reading in the public schools, Dr. R. H. Pitt, a Baptist, hit the nail squarely and solidly on the head when he said:

"While religion rests ultimately on choice, all human government rests ultimately upon physical force. This is its final appeal. Hence all laws to be effective must carry penalties, and the penalties are physical. Whenever, therefore, government, which rests finally on physical force, undertakes to administer in the realms of religion, which rests ultimately on freedom of choice, a monstrous perversion occurs and confusion and chaos follow. By the same token whenever religion, resting ultimately on free choice, undertakes to compel through physical penalties it loses its own soul and comes at length into public contempt and hatred."

Read this again and then once more.

The young man never came back and the father found great solace for his bereaved heart in carrying out in every detail his son's last wish.

The Divine Father said to His servant, the prophet Isaiah: "Before they call, I will answer." He is speaking of Israel and their blessings in the "new earth." But the promise is not limited to the purified remnant. God's promises are illimitable. All God's people of every age and clime are His children. If an earthly father is so desirous of fulfilling the wish of his child, how much more our Father in heaven! God even makes provisions for an answer to the expected call. "Thou preventest me with the blessings of goodness," said the Psalmist, meaning that God was always anticipating his need.
