#### DECEMBER CHURCH ATTENDANCE

Jerico 53, 117. Saude 63, 53.

Christmas services: Saude 131, Jerico 249.

Throughout the entire holiday season general good health, good weather, and good roads prevailed. With but few exceptions, there was nothing to hinder attendance at the various festival services.

Two gatherings of the younger set of Saude young folks were enjoyed at the parsonage, the last one on New Year's eve. During this meeting a temporary organization was effected. Miss Martha Munson was chosen temporary president and Gunhilda Treider secretary. A meeting will be held on Friday evening the 24th of this month at the parsonage when it is hoped the organization will be made permanent.

By the little gathering at the parsonage, the old year was closed with the reading of a portion of John 15. While the clock struck twelve all stood in silence with bowed heads. The new year was begun with the singing of an appropriate hymn of praise and

On one of the last days of the old year many enjoyed themselves in the Jerico basement as only Norwegians can when grouped about mountains of "lutefisk," stacks of "flatbrød" and little lakes of "fløte-grøt." Our sympathy goes out to all who missed that feast of Jerico Vikings. A slight of hand performer can extract a sausage a yard long from a German's vest pocket but it would puzzle him mightily to stow away as much "lutefisk" in a little while as the average Norwegian can.

To many homes absent sons and daughters returned to increase the happiness of the circle about the family

hearths. Our 1929 Christmas was a happy one and, we hope and believe, a blessed one to many heavy laden

During the year just closed twelve infants were baptized at Jerico and one at Saude. Two adults and one child were interred in the Jerico cemetery. Five youths were confirmed at Saude. One couple was married during the year, namely Gladys Nelson and Alvie Iverson. One hundred and forty-nine and two hundred and fifty-eight were communed at Saude and Jerico respectively.

Twenty-nine regular services were held in Saude at which 2,134 were in attendance. The average attendance was 74 which is 34 per cent of the membership. Speaking in averages, this means that 66 out of every one hundred souls enrolled as members did not respond to the call of the church bell.

Thirty regular services were held at Jerico. All told 4,474 were in attendance. The average attendance was 149 or 36 per cent of the membership. This shows that the average attendance at services was 36 out of every one hundred souls enrolled.

These figures are not based on estimates but on actual count and are as accurate as a neat little counting device in the hands of a conscientious person could make them.

Where were the 66 and the 64 while the 34 and the 36 were in their house of worship? I sincerely hope they were where they were for good and sufficient reasons valid before God.

If Simeon and Anna Phanuel's daughter had been hit and miss church attendants, I wonder if they would have happened to be in church the day the Christ child was brought there? It is quite possible that they might have missed the joy of seeing Him. As an irregular churchgoer Simeon might not have experienced that peace which passeth understanding and that prompted him to say: "Now lettest thou thy servant depart in peace, for mine eyes have seen thy salvation," and Anna might not have been filled with thanksgiving to the Lord and with words of cheer and assurance all them that looked for redemption in Jerusalem."

Simeon and Anna would not risk departing occasionally from the temple, without cause. They waited for the consolation of Israel and though they had for a long time found only the promises they continued going regularly to the house of God and in God's good time their perseverance and waiting was rewarded. They saw the Christ child as Joseph and Mary "brought Him in after the custom of the law." Luke

2, 25–38.
"I can not see that it does me any particular good Maybe von can't, but to go to church," says someone. Maybe you can't, but go anyway for there are promises connected with diligent churchgoing. "Blessed are they who hear the Word of God and keep it."

"Yes, but I have not experienced any blessings." Neither did Simeon and Anna experience the joy of seeing the Christ child the first time nor even, perhaps, the hundredth time, yet they believed and waited and kept on going. Anna was 84 years old when her eyes beheld the promised one. Would you say that your churchgoing had been in vain if you go, go, go, and go again till you are old before you can joyously exclaim with Andrew, "I have found Jesus":

Dear reader, seek the blessing promised the diligent hearer of God's Word and in God's chosen hour your seeking shall be rewarded. You shall be given to see with the eye of faith not only the virgin born child, Jesus, but the crucified and resurrected Savior of the world who has washed away your sins with His blood and who is gone to prepare a place for you in the heavenly mansions. Then you will be able to say: now let thy servant depart in peace at any time, at any place and in any manner, for mine eyes have seen thy salvation.

But I warn you earnestly, dear reader, let not the devil entice you to stay away from church on the very day perhaps that the Lord had planned to work His miracle of grace in you. It is not the Spirit that was in Simeon that moves anyone to stay away from church.
