In the May, 1930, issue of the Assistant Pastor can be found the terms of a certain agreement. The last paragraph reads: "If on or before June 1, 1935, cash sufficient for the purpose just named (liquidation of the entire Bethany College debt) and subject to the immediate call of said treasurer, is not at hand, the money herewith subscribed and actually paid in shall be returned to the respective donors without interest." The money thus conditionally subscribed and paid in, and held in trust by L. S. Roberson, was "returned to the respective donors" on Tuesday, the 27th of August, that is, checks were then issued by Mr. Roberson.

This does not mean that the Bethany indebtedness is a hopeless burden and that we have given up trying to pay it. It means only this that the effort started in 1930 to pay the whole and entire Bethany debt on or before June 1, 1935, has failed. It is not only possible, but entirely probable that if the slight pinch we felt in the spring of 1930 had not grown to such a serious pressure, our Bethany College would today have stood free of all indebtedness.

It should be and surely is a source of satisfaction to all that in spite of the back-breaking depression of the past five years, our Synod has not defaulted one single interest payment on its bonds or other debts. Our Synod's financial status is, therefore, relatively very good. For this we owe our Heavenly Father sincerest praise and thanks.
