Alton Gene Anderson

Interment was at Jerico Lutheran Cemetery on Tuesday, April 15th. His age was three years, seven months, and eighteen days.

Sermon

Mark 10:13-16

In Christ Jesus dearly beloved friends and family of the departed Alton Gene Anderson.

There is something particularly sharp and piercing in the pain that we all feel in the death of a child such as we have now witnessed. There seems to us so little purpose in the Lord's doings in giving life and birth to a little being, of creating a place of affection for him in the bosom of his family, and then so suddenly and without warning to take him away from them. His parents would not be human if they did not cry out, "Why has the Lord dealt thus with us?" His brother, his sister; all those whose

hearts have glowed at sight of that fine little boy would be less than the frail mortals they are if they did not cry out, "To what purpose has a merciful God dealt this rude and shattering blow?"

These questions are human indeed, and reflect the grief and pain that attends such acts and judgments of God. But you, Christians and believers, have answers for those questions; you have a balm in your grief. And your grief is not one which will now chide and reproach the Lord for this His judgment and chastening.

For the words of our text, "Suffer the little children to come unto me," ring in your ears now as a hymn of thanksgiving to God, who, though filling your home with grief, has dealt kindly and mercifully with this little one whom you love.

The circumstances under which the words of our text were spoken are familiar. Parents had brought their infants and young children to Jesus that He should touch them. Those parents, too, were believers. And their bringing their children to Jesus showed their desire that their precious ones should come under the influence of the Savior and be saved by Him. You were with those parents on that day when you brought this little boy to church to be baptized in the name of the Triune God, that he might be cleansed of his sin, and made a child of Jesus. You have been with those parents every time you have spoken to him of the Savior; every prayer that you have taught him, every word of admonition you have spoken to him has been your bringing of this child to Jesus. All that you have done for your little boy has been in obedience to the invitation of Jesus, "Suffer the little children to come unto me."

You have heeded Christ's invitation. Can you now be certain that he is in heaven with the Jesus to whom you brought him in baptism, in his prayers, and in your instruction? Most assuredly you can! When he was baptized the Holy Ghost performed a marvelous miracle. He took that child that had been conceived and born in sin and who came into this world an enemy of God and a child of Satan, and created faith in him. Yes, truly, the Holy Ghost made a believer of that infant, and there is no reason whatever for thinking that the child lost that faith, so miraculously instilled in him since

then.

Undoubtedly you have been thinking of how, if things had not gone as they did, his life might have been saved. But how unutterably worse would your regret now have been if you had not heeded the invitation of Jesus to "Suffer the little ones to come unto me." That your little boy was brought to Jesus may now be your pillar of strength and comfort.

For there can be no doubt that God's will has been done. Our text tells us that the disciples rebuked those who brought their children to Jesus, as though the soul of a child were of no concern to the Savior. He showed how great His concern is for them by the fact that He was extremely displeased with the disciples over their conduct in trying to prevent those parents from bringing their children to Jesus. He tells them, "Of such is the kingdom of God!" His meaning is clear. The saints in heaven are those whose faith is such as that of a child. We know how implicitly and unwaveringly a child believes the things his parents tell him. And here Jesus tells us to believe like little children. Their faith is the faith that we should pray for.

If Jesus' description of a true faith is true, then who of us will doubt the faith that this child had,

nor wonder about its soul's salvation?

Jesus says, "Suffer the little children to come unto me." Now He has come and has taken this little one. Whom among us would now wish to take him back from the arms of Jesus?

Whom among us will now be like the disciples who rebuked the parents who brought their children to Jesus, and turn about to rebuke Jesus for taking this little boy. Surely no one, and least of all his parents who loved him more than we. His

family are Christians, and they will gladly accept their loss and their grief and their broken hearts for the sake of the blessedness in which their beloved son and brother now dwells.

And finally, let me call to your minds the words of the child's stricken father who said, "He's safe now." Is there a father or mother among us who thinks at all who has not trembled as he thought of the responsibility that God gives us with each of our children, the responsibility of bringing up that child so that he will be prepared for the hour of death.

Truly God has been merciful to this child. Now He has taken the responsibility for this boy. He is where neither Satan or the world can tempt him. He dwells among the saints and angels to praise God for all eternity. Amen!

The above table lists the total amount contributed by the Saude and Jerico congregations from the beginning of this year until May 1st. It includes remittances made by the treasurers of the congregations, and remittances made by the pastor from memorial wreaths and other money given him to send to the treasurer of the Synod.

During past years the pastor was treasurer of the congregations so far as Synod contributions were concerned. He mailed the monthly envelopes out with the Assistant Pastor, took the money from the boxes in church, and mailed it to the treasurer of the Synod. However, since the envelope system has been adopted, the envelopes have been included in the packs of weekly envelopes, and remittances to the Synod treasurer have been made by the treasurers of the congregations. However, some money has still come to the pastor for remittance, such as memorial wreaths and other special individual donations. It naturally makes for confusion that remittances are made to the Synod by more than one person. Therefore, I would request that if you wish to make a special donation to the Synod, that you give the money to the treasurer of your congregation and not to me. And likewise the memorial wreaths will be given to the treasurers to remit.

In recent years the treasurer of the Synod has been requesting permission not to be obliged to print lists of names of donors of individual congregations, but only the totals sent in by the congregation as a whole. Some congregations have been willing to comply with that request. In recent memorial wreaths the money has been sent to the

treasurer, and you will find the individual contributions listed in this issue of the Assistant Pastor. Those lists of names have little meaning to persons who read the Sentinel. They are only of local interest, and therefore our purpose will be served if the lists are printed in the Assistant Pastor.

It has paid half the expense of redecorating the parsonage in 1941, and has bought two vases for the altar. It has sponsored an annual Christmas party, the proceeds of which have been sent to the Deaf Mute Institute, and has served dinner on each Mission Day, the proceeds going to Home Missions in the amount of about fifty dollars each year. It has kept the church clean, through regularly held house-cleaning days. It has cooperated with the pastor in every way, and has always been ready when there was work to be done for its church. In the year 1940-41, it contributed \$81.37 to various Synod purposes. In the year 1941-42 its contribution was \$121.70.

It set in motion preliminary moves which have brought about the construction of a new basement, and donated \$300.00 toward that project. It has met regularly for the purpose of cleaning the church, and paid one-half of the Saude congregation's share of the expenses connected with redecorating the parsonage last year. It has resolved to give one-half of its regular income toward Church and Charitable purposes. It is making plans for equipping its new kitchen, and redecorating the Altar and Pulpit and Altar rail. It has been alert and willing whenever it has seen an opportunity to serve its church. It remitted \$104.17 to the Synodical Treasury in the year 1940-1941.

It should be noted in the case of both Aids, that many members have given the suggested amount of money in place of serving, where, for one reason or another the person was unable to entertain in her turn.
