## CONFIRMATION SERMON

Ps. 31, 3.

In Christ Jesus, dearly beloved confirmants.

By the grace of God, you, dear confirmants, have come into a precious possession, a priceless in-This most valuable possession is your heritance. religion. God has given you this religion, this hope, through Jesus Christ your Savior. Let us think of your religion as a possession. That possession consists in knowledge, the knowledge that you have acquired through the religious instruction that you have received at home since your birth, and which has now been amplified in the instruction you have received out of God's Word during your confirmation instruction. That knowledge is something that is yours now. It belongs to you.

But in order better to understand the value and purpose of that knowledge, let us make a comparison. Let us compare this knowledge, this religion which you possess to a farm. Let us say that you own a farm. That is a worthy and valuable possession. But it is not like a basket of groceries that you can eat, or a suit of clothes that you can wear. No, your farm is valuable only in so far as it is a possession from which you can produce and earn the things that you need to eat and to wear. In other words your farm is like a chest of tools. Its value lies not in what it is, but in what you get out of it.

Let us say that you received on this day the title to a well improved and fertile farm. Suppose then that you were to sit back rejoicing over your possession, but should not use it. Very soon your farm would become overrun with weeds, the buildings would decay and collapse for want of care, and soon your farm would be a disgrace to you, and an eye-sore for all who were to look upon it. For lack of cultivation, your farm would soon be valueless, and you would soon be a pauper.

Your religion is like that, dear friends. You have it now and it is of priceless value. But your religion is something that must be used in order to benefit you. Your religion is like a farm that must be cultivated, like a chest of tools whose value lies in

the use to which they are put.

But let us be specific. What are the tools of our religion? They are three in number, God's Word, Baptism, and The Lord's Supper. These, as you have learned, are the Means of Grace, the means through which we receive the forgiveness of our sins and the salvation of our souls. Consider first the Word. Perhaps you will say "I know God's word, and I know how to be saved, namely through the merit of Jesus Christ, my Savior." But let me remind you of the devil. The Word of God which is now your possession is a beautiful green field. But Satan wants to destroy that field, so he plants weeds, that is sin, in it. If you will now cultivate your field you have God's promise that with His aid you will be able to keep those weeds, that sin, out. But if you do not cultivate this field of knowledge, your religion, then you have God's warning that the Devil will soon succeed in getting such an abundance of weeds started, that the fruit of your field will be choked out and finally destroyed. Your religion will then be destroyed, and your hope of salvation lost. God forbid that should happen. May he make you a constant reader and hearer of that Word which you have learned.

Consider your Baptism. Through it you were born again, you were made a new and holy person in Christ. You received in it a new life, and a new desire to do that which is pleasing to God. But you have also learned that in order to remain in the grace of your baptism you must daily shun sin, and cleave to Jesus as your only Savior from sin.

Consider the Lord's Supper. In it you receive the true body and blood of your Savior which was given and shed for you for the remission of your sins. By partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ you receive strength to believe that Jesus is your Savior, and that your sins are forgiven. But this precious gift, the Lord's Supper, is only of value to you in so far as you use it for the edification of your mind and soul.

Pray now, therefore, that you may use your religion for the salvation of your soul, and that it may not become valueless and a curse by disuse. Confess with the Psalmist; "Thou art my rock and my fortress". Pray now with the Psalmist, "For thy name's sake lead me, and guide me". As a farm is valueless without the sun and rain that God graciously sends down to earth, so the religion which is yours today will be valueless to you unless your Sanctifier leads and guides you. Satan is too powerful a foe for you to vanquish alone. But with God's help, you shall surely be able to use the religion, the knowledge He has given you for the salvation of your immortal soul. May God give you an earnest will and desire to serve Him. May He, your Rock and Fortress, lead you for Christ's sake. Amen.

#### THOMAS BORLAUG

The deceased, Thomas Borlaug, son of Ole O. and Solvei Borlaug was born in Dane County, Wisconsin, on May 17, 1857. He was baptized into the Christian faith by the Rev. H. A. Preus, one of the early leaders, and for a long time president of the Norwegian Synod. The church in which the family held membership was at Norway Grove, Wisconsin.

When the child, Thomas, was three years old in 1860, he emigrated with his family to Vermillion, South Dakota, where his father staked out a claim and established a home. The family remained there for three years, then returned to Iowa, remaining in Calmar for one year, and then settling in the Little Turkey community, where it remained from the year 1865 to the present time. Only one of the children now remains, namely a sister of the deceased, Mrs. Ole Natvig.

Concerning the early history of the family we quote from the February, 1930, issue of the Assistant Pastor. "The Civil War had broken out (at about the time when the family moved to Vermillion) and there was unrest and disturbance in the air all over. The bloody Indian outbreaks at Spirit Lake, New Ulm, Willmar, and other places occurred. The new settlements in South Dakota were fearful of a like fate, but were at that time unmolested. The day came, however, a year or two later, when they, too, fled for their lives. The old covered wagon, sunbaked and rickety, was hurriedly loaded, the oxen hooked on, and the flight, at snail's pace, was on. Among the refugees was the Borlaug family. Some of those who fled from South Dakota at this time became the founders of the Crane Creek settlement while the Borlaug wagon rolled slowly on till it reached Calmar. Here it rested only a year. The oxen were again hooked on and in a day or two they reached the young settlement known as Little Turkey. About a mile and a half northwest from the hub of the settlement, the Prairie Schooner was anchored.'

The deceased was confirmed into the Lutheran faith by the Rev. U. V. Koren, another great leader and president of the Norwegian Synod. He remained a member of Saude Lutheran Church until his death, and remained his entire lifetime on the soil which his family began to till in 1865, the year of the close of the Civil War.

He was married to Johanne Swenson in September 1885. Many of his friends in the community heard his oft repeated remark, "My children had a good mother." To this happy union were born ten children, of which two, Selva Gurina and an infant child preceded their father in death. Mrs. Borlaug entered into eternal rest on November 9, 1921.

His children who remain to mourn his passing are, Karl, Simon, Olis, Thomas, Anna, Hanna (Mrs. Norman Nelson), Sena, and Vilmar; also one sister, Mrs. Ole Natvig, and two grandchildren, Sigrid Johanna Nelson, and David Olis Borlaug. All reside in this community.

Though he had been somewhat infirm for some time because of his old age, his final illness was brief, and his death peaceful and serene. He passed

away on April 12, 1943, at the age of 85 years, 10 months, and 26 days.

Blessed be the memory of this Christian father!
