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YOU AND YOUR BIBLE

Nearly two thousand years have passed since that Holy choir sang on earth. Yet we still have that message, we still have the happy Christmas story. Do we appreciate as we should the Book that keeps that story so true and fresh before us? Do we keep clear in our minds the fact that this precious story was written by the sacred writers under the guidance and inspiration of God Himself? Have you really acquainted yourself with this priceless volume?

Priceless

Yes, the Bible is priceless, because of all the countless volumes that have been written since the beginning of time, this is the only one that has been given to us by God Himself. Think of it! The Bible is written by the same being who created the whole marvellous universe. The Supreme Being who has watched over the course of history since its very beginning has written a volume that contains history. What a history book that ought to be. He who established the laws of nature and put them in motion has caused to be written a book that contains scientific facts and statements. What a scientific treatise that should be. He who so lovingly created man in his own image, only to see him rebel and bring a curse upon himself, has written a book that tells man how he may be saved in spite of his sins. What a book of religion that ought to be. It is indeed a great book. As great as we should expect a book to be with so great an author as God Himself.

Truthful

The Bible is truthful too; it contains nothing but perfect and flawless truth. We can depend on its truthfulness because it was written by an omniscient and all-knowing God. Yes, God knows everything; what was, what is, and what will be. The revelation of such an author should be perfectly truthful; and it is. When historians write a history book they are obliged to depend on what people in times past have written about the times in which they lived. They must depend upon the inferences they may make from ruins of past ages for the manner in which people lived. But the inferences historians make are often wrong. The records of the past that they read are always colored by the particular writer's bias. Therefore history books must constantly be brought up to date by new researches and studies. Scientists are constantly studying the laws of nature in order to discover why things are as they are. But new discoveries and new research are constantly making new and revised textbooks in

science necessary.

Men have sought through the ages for the answer as to how the universe came into being. They have reached many different conclusions. But all of them are wrong. The simple truth is to be found in the Bible. Men have studied the question of morals from the beginning of time. But they could have been spared their brain-ache, because the best system of morals, the best answer as to what is right and wrong is given in the Ten Commandments. Men have studied human nature in the science called psychology in order to learn why people act and behave as they do. They would have found a simple answer to the problem of human behavior in the Bible. What they have written, these scientists, moralists and psychologists, have been their own frequently erring opinions. In fact every book ever written which purported to give facts has had to be revised in order to keep abreast of new findings. None of these volumes will ever be perfect.

The Bible alone has stood unchanged through the centuries. And the simple reason has been that it was true from the beginning. A book that contains perfect truth never needs revision. Many revisions of the Bible have been made, but the outstanding thing about all of them has been the fact that they themselves have been in need of further revisions. None of them will ever be good revisions until they are revised back to the original form of the Bible.

A Living Word

The Bible differs also from all other books in that it is a living book, its word a living word. Just as God, who gave us the Scriptures, is a living God, so the book of religion which He has given the world is a living and life-giving word. St. Paul speaks of the Gospel as a "power of God unto salvation". Jesus at the well of Sychar spoke to the Samaritan woman, saying, "Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again: But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst". The water that He referred to there was God's Holy word. That water, He said, "shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life." It is as different from all other forms of the printed word as a live wire, charged with electricity, is different from a dead wire. The live wire has the power to run motors, to light lamps, and keep in motion the great wheels of modern industry. A dead wire is just a piece of wire. The dynamo or generator sends electric current invisibly through the wires that conduct it. The Bible is charged with life and power by the God who gave it to us. And, wonder of wonders, this marvellous volume is not merely something which we have read about, but something we may read. It is ours, and it is in the possession of all of us. Just think how curious and anxious you would be to have a chance to read the Bible if you had not seen or read it before and someone would tell you about it and about all its wonderful divine properties. It is as accessible to us as water, and perhaps as little appreciated, and yet, we can scarcely live a week without water. No more can we live spiritually without the knowledge given us in the Scriptures.

A Spiritual Word

It is a strange paradox that the Bible, though given by God to all men, is a sealed and closed book to many. That is because of the fact that unlike all other books it is a spiritual book. The Bible cannot be read as other books and grasped by the understanding. It requires the aid of the Holy Spirit to open our minds so that we receive what the Scriptures say. There is a blindness of the eyes. But there is also a blindness of the mind. Our understanding has been darkened, our minds have been made blind to the truths of Scripture by sin and Satan. In our natural unconverted state we are in such state that the Bible says of us, "The natural man receiveth not the things of God; for they are foolishness unto him; neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned." We were dead in trespasses and sins. That is why we could not discern the truths of Scripture. But now, through the Holy Ghost working in us through Baptism and God's Word, we are made spiritually alive. Now we can read and grasp the sacred truths. That is why we should not treat the Bible as other books. We should approach it prayerfully, asking for the Holy Spirit's guidance as we read it. Only prayerful and devout reading can give to us the life and power that is ours in God's Word. The wisdom of the ages has failed to fathom the Bible; but little children may know the great message it contains. Would-be wise men who use their own intellects to try to judge as to the truthfulness and the value of the Bible find many things to criticize in it. They are like the young student of astronomy who thought he had found a new spot on the sun. His teacher showed him that it was only a speck on the lens of the telescope. So every critcism of the Bible is just another evidence of the weakness of the human mind which can not grasp the great things God has revealed to us. The Bible is open only to those who believe what God says. To them it is a well of eternal life. To them it is the world's greatest treasure.

What Can Bible Reading Do for You?

It will make you better acquainted with Christ, for the Bible is the book about Christ. The better you know Christ, the closer you are to heaven. Christ is your Savior, the Son of God who was slain because you had sinned. The better you know Christ the more you will love Him, and the better Christian you will be.

The Bible is a guide to salvation and a rule of life. It shows, as no other book can, what God has done to save us. It shows, better than any other book, how we ought to live. The principal precepts of Scripture are humility toward God, and generosity toward our fellow men. Those two things are the secrets of a good life here and in eternity.

First and foremost the Bible shows you the way to salvation. But in the second place it makes you a better person. It makes you a better personality, a better citizen, a better parent, a better soldier or sailor; it makes you better in every respect.

If you have sinned it offers forgiveness. If you are in trouble it gives comfort. If you are weak it

strengthens you.
