OUR SCHOOL

Our school will open, God willing, on Monday, September 3. No undertaking your pastor has ever been associated with has ever shown such repeated manifestations of Divine providence as this school. Time and again obstacles have stood in its way. But in His way God has seen to it that each obstacle has been removed so that our school could carry on. This year I had doubted very seriously that we would be able to reopen. One difficulty was the fact that there is a most serious teacher shortage. Another is that we had no building this year. But each of these needs have been met.

Mr. LeVine Hagen graciously consented to take a year out of school so as to make the continuation of the school possible. And at the last minute a building was secured which will be placed at Saude.

Authorized by meetings of the congregations which took place this summer, your pastor appointed a committee from each congregation to consider certain problems connected with the conduct of the school. The committee from the Jerico Congregation consisted of Clarence Cutsforth, Ole J. Johnson and J. A. Robinson. The committee for the Saude Congregation consisted of Henry Borlaug, Fred Steensland and Enus Ferkingstad. These committees met with the School Board of the school. They recommended that for the present it may be best that the school remain a private school rather than be sponsored directly by the congregations. They appointed Enus Ferkingstad and John Robinson to attend the auction of the school building to purchase it for the school. They recommended that it be placed in a location most favorable for the Saude Congregation and that the School Bus be used to furnish transportation for as many of the Jerico children as possible.

By resolution made at our annual meetings we have held an annual offering in behalf of the New Hampton Mission, and the Christian Day School. This offering will be taken this year at Saude on September 9, and at Jerico on September 16. This will be an altar offering and envelopes will be distributed for the offering. In view of the fact that a

building was purchased this year we hope you will contribute accordingly. The patrons of the school are also requested to bring their contributions for the purchase of the building at this time.

Yes, we realize that the operation of our school entails some expense. But it is much more than worth what it costs. The war that we have just gone through has just shown us the woeful inadequacy of public school education. It has shown that education that ignores Christianity is education for worldliness and godlessness. And that is not good enough for our children.

We are continuing our school because nothing but the best is good enough for the precious souls God has given us for safe-keeping. We want the education our children receive to emphasize Christianity, and to ground them firmly in the truths that are our salvation.

Our school has been a success. That is evident from many things we see in the moral development of the children and, though this is not so important, from the fact that three of our five graduates last year were worthy of the honor roll.

Please consider seriously sending your child if it is in any way possible for you. Your child will

benefit wonderfully from it.
